A Moment with the Mayor

At the American Flood Coalition's Summit on Flooding and Sea Level Rise, Mayor Lois Paritsky participated alongside mayors from all over the nation and local leaders in Washington, DC. The three-day summit in June included meetings with federal specialists and members of Congress and examined solutions to flooding and sea level rise.

As residents in Ponce Inlet face stronger storms and more frequent flooding, the summit provided Mayor Paritsky with the opportunity to collaborate with other leaders facing comparable issues.

As a barrier island with water on three sides, the Town of Ponce Inlet is particularly vulnerable to the impacts of flooding and sea level rise. These effects are present in the infrastructure supporting the services vital to the wellbeing and the safety of our citizens and guests.

Mayor Paritsky was a panelist at the Summit, presenting Ponce Inlet's best practices for building resilience in Ponce Inlet through local planning, all of which led to the Vulnerability Assessment that was adopted by the Town Council in February 2022.



The three days of policy-focused roundtables and meetings included:

- Discussions with Mitch Landrieu, White House Senior Advisor and Infrastructure Coordinator, and senior officials from EPA, FEMA, and NOA. In addition, Wes Brooks, Head of Resilience in Florida, accompanied by AFC State Directors, discussed building resilience at the state level.
- Federal funding and resources, policy, communications, and resilience planning.
- An understanding of resources and actions available to our community to address flooding in our community by identifying top risks, planning and project development, and policy advancement and funding applications.

- Provided concrete resources and tools that have been shared with our Town staff; specifically, the federal and state grant opportunities and federal government contacts should intervention or help be required to resolve a concern at the federal level.

- A commitment from leaders to be speakers on platforms, specifically the Volusia League of Cities Mayor's Zoom calls and at the League's business dinner meetings, to provide further service for our residents.

Mayor Paritsky also met with congressional delegation members; specifically, Senator Rubio and legislative aids of Senator Rick Scott, helping to further collaborate on solutions with our federal partners on the impacts of flooding and sea level rise.

Beat the Heat and Catch Some Rays at the Ponce Inlet Lighthouse By Zach Hopple

Although school was out for the children of Volusia County, the Ponce Inlet Lighthouse and Museum's Programs Department did not slow down the educational programming during the summer months. Summer camps, educational outreach, and guided tours may have replaced school visits temporarily, but maritime and social history continued to be the focus of the Ponce Inlet Lighthouse volunteers and staff.

Collaboration with the local community and other cultural centers across Volusia County is a main focus of the Programs Department. Participating in events across the county, including DeBary Hall's Living History Day, Volusia County Schools F.A.C.T. Fair, Ponce Inlet Community Days, and New Smyrna Museum Heritage Day, the dedicated volunteers of Ponce Inlet Lighthouse were able to dispense maritime and lighthouse education to hundreds of participants. The volunteers of the Ponce Inlet Lighthouse regularly visit other cultural centers and museums to advance their knowledge of the local community. Ponce Inlet Lighthouse is proud to offer a variety of onsite events throughout the summer and fall months. On August 6th, 2022, the Ponce Inlet Lighthouse hosted National Lighthouse Day from 10:30am until 2:30pm. This fun-filled day of learning featured a special presentation on What is a Lighthouse, as well as the ability to get up close and personal with artifacts from over 100 years ago, guided tours throughout the day, children's activities, and much more. Entrance to this special event is included with regular admission rates.

Other onsite events included Spirit of '45 Day which was held on Saturday August 13th. An upcoming Labor Day Celebration will be held on Monday September 5th from 10:30am until 2:30pm.

Throughout the summer, the Ponce Inlet Lighthouse and Museum has provided educational programming for the Volusia County Library system in conjunction with their theme, Oceans of Possibilities. Children of all ages from across the county have taken part in this joint venture, learning and enjoying presentations on artifacts, the Science of Light, as well as readings of Nelly the Lighthouse Cat. Nelly herself has even made an appearance before an excited crowd of youngsters. Be sure to check the Ponce Inlet Lighthouse Event Calendar for more opportunities.

The Programs Department is preparing for another big school year. Using the summer months to prepare high-quality, engaging education for the fall term, the lighthouse is looking forward to welcoming children from across the state once again. Homeschool co-op groups, public school classes, and private schools are lining up for dates to tour the museum or have our costumed

docents in their classrooms. Educational workshops are provided fee-free to all Volusia public schools and with a nominal charge to homeschool groups. For more information about group and school tours, please contact Programs Manager Zach Hopple at zhopple@ponceinlet.org.

On May 5th, 2022, the Programs Department hosted homeschool students from across the state for the annual Spring Homeschool Day. Building off of the success of the homeschool day in the Fall of 2021, school-age students received high-quality, standards-based learning focusing on the topic What is a Lighthouse? All lessons for the day were delivered through the STEAM lens, including workshops on why the lighthouse is so tall, the science behind harnessing light, families and artifacts of the lighthouse, and the function of lighthouses. This day included hands-on activities and a take-home craft and educational activities to continue the learning long after the day has concluded. All programming was given by the fabulous volunteers of the lighthouse and the partnership with Daytona State College student teachers.

Adult education continues to be a key component of the Ponce Inlet Lighthouse Programs Department. Delivering high-quality historical presentations, presenters from the lighthouse have engaged with over 750 people across Volusia County. Maritime, lighthouse, and social history topics have captivated spectators, with many more speaking dates that have already been announced. One of the most popular onsite offerings here at the lighthouse is our monthly Climb to the Moon event. This event offers guests the opportunity to toast the setting of the

The success of all of the programs provided by the Ponce Inlet Lighthouse depends on the dedication and hard work of our amazing volunteer corps. Monthly meetings and training will be provided for all volunteers, as well as the opportunity to preserve and interpret the history of a National Historic Landmark. -Monday and Thursday are Aerobics and Toning with Kathleen at 9:00am and Yoga with Chelsea at 6:30pm.


-Tuesday and Thursday is Fitness and Fun with Joanne at 10:30am.

PONCE INLET ANIMAL WELFARE BY NANCY EPPS, PRESIDENT



Our little colony is still thriving with our two permanent residents, Ruthie Grace and Tiki, and an occasional visit from a box turtle.

Our faithful volunteers are there every day, providing food, water, and love to the cats. I want to again thank the generous residents who have donated time, food, and money. I received another call last week from a new resident who wants to help, and I'm sure she will find it as rewarding as we "regulars" do.

Although dogs are generally at a higher risk of overheating in the summer, cats can also be at risk, especially if they are outdoors. PAW highly recommends all pets be kept inside for safety reasons, but we accept that it is not always possible. If your pets are outdoors, be aware that they need extra cool water at this time of year, and shade is mandatory. Never tether a dog in a place where it cannot find shade. If your cat is inside and outside, make sure they are inside as much as possible in the heat of the day. Both dogs and cats will pant if they become overheated, so keep a close eye on them for that, plus other telltale signs like lethargy, vomiting, red gums and mouth, or making strange noises. Get them to the


veterinarian immediately if any of these signs occur.

Indoor animals can have problems, too, although it is not as likely if you have adequate temperature control. If indicated, use a ceiling or floor fan to help circulate air, and keep blinds and curtains closed during the heat of the day.

I had a personal pet tragedy on June 13th when I learned that my beloved tortie, Daggett, had adenocarcinoma of the lungs and she was euthanized. A few days later, I found a tortie on NextDoor who needed a home due to her person having developed allergies to cat dander, so I now have Callie, a very sweet cat who is gradually adjusting to her new home.

PEDESTRIAN SAFETY - CROSSWALKS

In Florida, even in the absence of traffic control signals, automobiles are nonetheless required to yield—slow down or stop—for a pedestrian using a crosswalk.

To maintain the security and comfort of all road users, it is the duty of both drivers and pedestrians to familiarize themselves with Florida’s driver yeild regulations.

FACTS: PEDESTRIAN SAFETY


Florida Statutes - Pedestrians; traffic regulations

F.S. 316.130 (7)*: Florida law requires drivers to stop and remain stopped at any marked crosswalk to allow a pedestrian to cross a roadway when the pedestrian steps into or is in the crosswalk. *Summarized. Multiple statutes apply.

FAILURE TO YIELD = **\$164** + **3 POINTS**
minimum fine on your license

National Data

Federal reports estimate more than 76,000 pedestrians were injured and 6,200 pedestrians were killed in 2019.⁽¹⁾



Pedestrian deaths decreased by 2.7% from 2018 to 2019. That's an decrease of 169 lives lost, from 6,374 to 6,205.⁽¹⁾



59%
occurred on high traffic, high speed, wide roads

Heavy traffic, high speeds and wide roads make main thoroughfares dangerous for pedestrians. In 2018, 59% of pedestrian fatalities happened on these roads.⁽⁷⁾

Florida Data

Pedestrians make up more than 22% of all the traffic fatalities.⁽¹⁾

Florida accounts for more than 11% of all pedestrian deaths in the country.⁽¹⁾

Metro Orlando Data

On average, 3 pedestrians are injured every day, and at least 1 is killed every week.⁽⁴⁾



Florida metropolitan areas were ranked as the most dangerous places to walk in the nation (including Orlando-Kissimmee-Sanford).⁽²⁾



What are some of the contributing factors?

1 Speed hit by a vehicle traveling:



1 out of 10 survives



9 out of 10 survive

2 Streets designed for cars, rather than for the safety of all road users.

3 Drivers who violate traffic laws and drive distracted. Example: You **MUST YIELD** and stop for a pedestrian in a crosswalk (even if you have a green light).

Across the country, there is an epidemic of pedestrian deaths. In 2019, a pedestrian was killed every 85 minutes, nationwide.⁽¹⁾ **In 2009, Smart Growth America's Dangerous by Design report named Metro Orlando the #1 most dangerous place in the country for pedestrians. In 2021, we are still at the top of the list.**⁽²⁾

From 2010 to 2019, nearly **54,500** Americans walking were hit and killed by drivers.⁽¹⁾



Fast Facts About BFF

Proven progress – More drivers are complying with the law and yielding to pedestrians in crosswalks today than they were 8 years ago.



On roads 40 mph or higher, the driver yield rate has risen from 2% to 43% over the last 8 years.

Best Foot Forward's educational initiatives include community outreach efforts where pedestrian safety messages are presented to communities where locals live and play. The program's message has been presented to more than 130,000 Central Florida residents since 2012.

In The Numbers

20% of pedestrian fatalities nationwide involved hit-and-run drivers.⁽¹⁾



14% of pedestrian fatalities in Florida occur in marked crosswalks.⁽⁵⁾

Between 2018 and 2019, pedestrian fatalities in the Orlando Metro area increased by 22%.⁽⁶⁾

It's not the tourists' fault:

93% of pedestrians killed in Florida live here.
96% of drivers who hit pedestrians in Florida live here.⁽⁶⁾


Central Florida has an established problem with crashes that injure and kill pedestrians. The **Best Foot Forward Coalition** believes the status quo is unacceptable. There is no silver bullet to end pedestrian crashes, but previous successes, combined with continued persistence can make a proven difference. Pedestrians' deaths & injuries are not accidents, but crashes that can be prevented.

In 2012, the Best Foot Forward coalition formed with MetroPlan Orlando, the City of Orlando and Orange County as founding partners. The program has expanded to include Osceola and Seminole Counties and the cities of Apopka, Casselberry, Kissimmee, Longwood, Oakland, St. Cloud and Winter Park. We are proud to work with more than 30 partners to make Central Florida safer for all road users.

The mission of the Best Foot Forward program is to lower pedestrian fatalities and injuries by getting more drivers to yield and stop for people in crosswalks, as Florida law requires.

THE LAW IS CLEAR:

In Florida, drivers must slow down or stop for a pedestrian crossing the road in a crosswalk, even when traffic control signals or yield signs are not present.

FLORIDA DRIVER YIELD LAW

Fla. Stat. § 316.130



Drivers must stop for pedestrians at marked or unmarked intersections and mid-block crosswalks.



Drivers may not overtake and pass vehicles stopped at a crosswalk to permit a pedestrian to cross.



Turning drivers must stop for a pedestrian, with a permitted walk signal, to cross the roadway.



Drivers must come to a complete stop at crosswalks with signs indicating that a full stop is required.
