### REGULAR MEETING MINUTES

August 7, 2023

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1. CALL TO ORDER & PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE: Pursuant to proper notice, Chairperson Bell called the meeting to Order at 5:30 PM in the Council Chambers, located at 4300 S. Atlantic Avenue, Ponce Inlet, Florida and led the attendees in the Pledge of Allegiance.

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2. ROLL CALL & DETERMINATION OF QUORUM: A quorum was established with five members and one alternate present.

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**3. ADOPTION OF AGENDA:** Chair Bell asked if there were changes; Ms. French announced she will be providing the update on the cell tower and not Chief Scales.

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Ms. Finch moved to adopt the agenda as amended; seconded by Ms. LaBarre. The motion PASSED by consensus, 5-0.

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### 4. APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

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**A. June 5, 2023** – Chair Bell asked if there were any changes; there were none.

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Ms. Finch moved to approve the June 5, 2023, meeting minutes as presented; seconded by Ms. LaBarre. The motion PASSED by consensus, 5-0.

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### 5. REPORT OF STAFF:

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**A.** Cultural Services Update – Ms. French provided an update on the invasive air potato vine in Ponce Preserve; these vines were addressed July 2022. Extensive research with a forester was conducted at that time, and air potato beetles were released; the beetles focus on the

leaves. The town had an environmental consultant assess the issue who noted that the beetles are still present; they are not detrimental to the trees. The consultant suggested pairing their services with a community event utilizing volunteers to help remove the vines in the winter months. There is no machinery or equipment used. Staff is waiting on proposals from the consulting firm to remove these vines which would be provided to the Town Council for fiscal year 2023/24. Ms. Keese asked if the town is in compliance with the Ponce Preserve Master Plan; Ms. French replied yes. This is a multi-year process and very labor intensive to remove the vines from the entire park. Ms. Keese asked if the town could use the high schools for assistance. Ms. French stated the event will be open to whoever would like to volunteer. Ms. LaBarre asked Ms. French to address the issue with the Brazilian pepper; Ms. French noted that it is also an invasive species and are removed immediately when found. Staff is trained to find them and remove them. Chair Bell asked if a resident found a Brazilian pepper, should they contact the Public Works Department; Ms. French replied yes.

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**B.** Cell Tower update – Ms. French stated the town is still in negotiations and an update will be provided when available.

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Ms. Keese commented she has a concern regarding the leaning light pole on Peninsula Drive at Pollard Park; she asked if it could be shored-up. Mr. Griffith replied that Public Works is ordering a new pole that will take two to three weeks to receive.

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#### 6. **OLD BUSINESS:** None.

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#### 7. **NEW BUSINESS:**

A. Town of Ponce Inlet 60th Anniversary Party – Discussion of Time Capsule – Ms. 71 French announced the town will host its 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Party on September 16, 2023; in addition 72 to other activities, a time capsule was suggested to mark this historic event. The Ponce Inlet 73 Lighthouse staff have offered to assist with this activity by utilizing proper archival techniques to 74 75 76 77 78 79 80 81 82 83 84

collect and preserve items that would be placed inside. The Board suggested items such as photos, documents representing 2023, books relevant to the town, etc. Staff researched materials and sizes of time capsules to fit the items suggested. She reviewed the options which include burying the capsule, displaying the capsule indoors, or displaying the items without enclosing them in a time capsule. The estimated costs range from \$1,100 - \$1,500 to bury (depending on size); or \$700 -\$1,700 to display (depending on size and if in a capsule or not). Although burying the capsule is the traditional method, displaying the capsule or items is considered safer because it would be within a climate-controlled environment. This event is on a strict budget and the cost cannot exceed \$1,300. The Ponce Inlet Lighthouse staff suggested opening the time capsule at the town's 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Staff is seeking direction from the Board on whether to have this activity for the 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Party event, and if so, whether to display or bury the time capsule with specific requests that the Board make a recommendation to the Town Council on the method and location.

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Members discussed the options and whether to display or bury the time capsule. Chair Bell opened public comment. Mr. Skip White, 4885 S. Atlantic Avenue, stated if the decision is to make the time capsule mobile, to publicize it as it would attract more visitors to whatever location it is at

89 90 such as the museum.

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Chair Bell moved to display a hybrid time capsule to be displayed throughout the town on a rotating basis to be opened at staff's discretion; seconded by Ms. Finch. The Board agreed by consensus; 5-0.

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Discussion of Mascot Naming Contest - Ms. French stated an idea has been В. brought forth related to the town's 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Party event to select a mascot for the town. Residents could participate in a town-wide survey to suggest their ideas to the Cultural Services Board for review. Staff would then ask the Board to narrow down the suggestions to three to five; the finalists would be voted on by the event's planning committee and announced the day of the event. This would be voted on at the September 11, 2023, Cultural Services Board meeting' the event is September 16, 2023. Staff is seeking direction from the Board on whether to have this activity for the 60th Anniversary Party event. A handout was provided of photos of the City of DeBary's mascot, Clayton the Dinosaur. Gary the Gopher Tortoise has been suggested as a town mascot; other suggestions are welcome. Staff is asking if there is an idea for a town mascot that could be used in the future for events, promotional activities, etc. Ms. Finch commented that the Marine Science Center already has a turtle as a mascot so she would not want another turtle. Chair Bell stated that she was involved with the mascot process for the Marine Science Center; mascots are a good idea, but a good costume can be very expensive. Mr. Disher explained how the Clayton the Dinosaur became the city of DeBary's mascot and how the city utilizes him. The idea was to see if this Board is interested in exploring the idea of a mascot, and if so, we can have a contest between now and the 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Party and to announce the winner at the event. The contest or survey could be placed on the C4PI website for input. The idea is to decide on a mascot and a name; costumes, logos, etc. could wait until another year. The Board could have a few ideas for the public to choose from. The Board members discussed ideas for mascots and how to conduct the survey. Ms. French noted that staff would review submittals to ensure they are appropriate and then have the Cultural Services Board narrow down the options. Chair Bell suggested providing a QR code for the public to download and vote on the ideas for a mascot.

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The Board agreed by consensus to provide a survey and QR code at the 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Party event for staff to review the submittals and bring back to the Board for discussion; 5-0.

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**7. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION:** Chair Bell opened public comment. Ms. Barbara Davis, 4871 Sailfish Drive, stated the air potato invasive vines came before the board twice last year. She provided printouts of portions of the July 11, 2022 and September 12, 2022 Cultural Services Board minutes where the vines were discussed. She also provided print outs of the Ponce Preserve Management Plan and the Florida Exotic Pest Plant Council list. The Native Plant Chapter recommended Young Bear Environmental Consulting who are experts in this. She provided photos of air potato vines, muscadine grape vines, and Brazilian peppers within Ponce Preserve and their locations so that they can be removed.

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138 139 Chair Bell asked Ms. Davis to provide the history and background of Pone Preserve. Ms. Davis explained how Ms. Lynn Morris, Ms. Margie Rizzio, and Ms. Debbie Keese formed the PLAY (Ponce Living Actively Year-round) committee years ago to find recreational space. Former Senator Dorothy Hukill was on the council at the time and was instrumental in this endeavor. They found 40 acres from the river to the ocean which is now Ponce Preserve. They submitted for a grant and was awarded the grant of approximately \$1.2 million. Ms. Davis provided the history of how that grant was used and how the money was raised through t-shirt sales to buy the property and how Ponce Preserve came to be. There was an incident yesterday where she came across

palmetto berry harvester; she contacted the police; however, they were unable to catch the harvester. There are places that sell the berries locally, one in Edgewater. It is time to put out the warning signs and for people to be aware of the harvesters and report them. Chair Bell noted that this is a seasonal, repetitive problem. She thanked Ms. Davis and the PLAY Committee as Ponce Preserve is the greatest gift to the community and one of the most spectacular places in Volusia County. Ms. Davis referred to the time capsule discussed earlier and suggested it be put on display here and to duplicate it to display at the museum. Chair Bell explained the idea is to rotate the location of where the capsule would be displayed. Ms. Davis explained how the humane society had various graphics over the years and she has the sea dog in her possession; she would be happy to donate him to the town as the town mascot.

**9. BOARD/STAFF DISCUSSION:** Mr. Disher thanked Ms. Davis for contacting the police regarding the palmetto berry harvesting. He announce the Police Department is currently looking for volunteers to keep a watch for harvesters between 4:00 am and 8:00 am and again between 4:30 pm and 8:00 pm; he encouraged anyone interested to contact the department for details and to contact the police if they see anything as it is illegal to harvest palmetto berries.

**10. ADJOURNMENT:** The meeting was adjourned at 6:11 p.m.

**MEETING DATE:** December 4, 2023

At the August 7, 2023, Cultural Services Board meeting, the Board was presented an idea to have a survey for a town mascot that would not conflict with mascots of other Ponce Inlet organizations. The Board agreed by consensus for staff to provide a survey at the 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Party, for staff to review the submittals, and bring the results back for Board discussion. At the Welcome Table of the event, staff provided a QR code for an online survey as well as a paper survey for ideas for a town mascot.

A total of 44 submissions were received:

- 86.4% answered "Yes" to the Town having its own Mascot (**Exhibit 1**)
- 68.2% of total survey responses were from Ponce Inlet residents (Exhibit 2)

**Exhibit 3** provides a table of Town Mascot suggestions by count, which is further divided into Ponce Inlet residents and out-of-town responses. The leading mascot suggestion was a sea turtle, which would conflict with the Marine Science Center's mascot.

Staff is seeking direction from the Board on whether to have a town mascot, and if so, for the Board to make a recommendation to Town Council on 3 mascot suggestions from **Exhibit 3**.





### Introduction

- 2 The applicant, representing Volusia County, lessee, as authorized by the State of Florida, owner,
- 3 requests approval of the landscape and tree protection plans for the expansion of the Marine
- Science Center Learning Center. Pursuant to Section 4.10.5 of the Land Use and Development 4
- 5 Code (LUDC), landscape plans submitted in association with a final development plan application
- 6 shall be referred to the Cultural Services Board for review and comment prior to review by the
- 7 Planning Board and/or Town council. The landscape plan is one component of the final site
- 8 development plan package that will be provided to the Planning Board and Town Council in
- 9 December and January respectively. The Board is now asked to provide a recommendation to the
- 10 Planning Board and Town Council on the landscape plan and tree protection plan.

### 12 **Property Overview**

- 13 The subject area is located west of S. Atlantic Avenue at 100 Lighthouse Drive (see Attachment
- 14 1). The entire Marine Science Center (MSC) property as bounded by Atlantic Avenue to the east,
- 15 Lighthouse Drive to the south, Peninsula Drive to the west, and the lighthouse preservation
- 16 association property to the north is approximately 5.9 acres; however, only the Learning Center
- 17 expansion and parking lot portion of the site will be discussed for purpose of this report.

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- 19 The subject property is zoned P/I (Public/Institutional) and has a corresponding future land use
- map designation of *Public/Institutional* that is consistent with the zoning district. The P/I zoning 20

district permits activity of federal, state, and local governments as well as quasi-public and private activities or facilities that will serve the public interest in an educational, recreational, or scientific context. The property is also located in the Lighthouse Overlay District (LOD) and is subject to the supplementary regulations for properties within 750 feet from the historic lighthouse.

The subject site area is currently developed with an existing learning center, turtle rehabilitation sanctuary, turtle commissary, bird rehabilitation sanctuary, raptor exhibit, and natural vegetation. A limited area is proposed to be cleared to accommodate the proposed Learning Center building expansion.

### **Review of Application**

The project includes the expansion of the education building (1,658 SF) and the addition of a turtle quarantine deck (1,064 SF). The learning center expansion will replace an existing small classroom to provide an improved indoor area for summer programs. The quarantine deck will not be open to the public. The quarantine deck will provide an isolated area for sick turtles to prevent disease or infection from spreading to other turtles. There will be 22 parking spaces added to the expanded parking lot and a new sidewalk connecting the parking lot to an existing sidewalk. The access driveway to the project area will remain in its existing location.

The landscape plan has been designed to meet the Town's tree protection and landscaping requirements to the greatest extent possible, balancing the desire for lush landscaping with the need for cleared space for the expanded structure and parking lot. The landscape plans were initially submitted on May 23, 2023. The plans were then reviewed by the staff Development Review Team (DRT) for completeness and compliance with code provisions. Revised plans were submitted October 6, 2023. The October 6, 2023, plans are attached to this report for the Board's review. The significant aspects are discussed below:

### Tree Protection and Removal

- A. The plan (see **Attachment 2**) calls for the removal of 18 Live Oak trees, 3 Bay trees and 2 Cedar trees, of which zero are specimen-size trees. Because trees are being preserved outside of the designated protection zone, the replacement ratio is 1:1. Furthermore, pursuant to LUDC 4.10.4.E, heavily wooded lots do not require tree replacements if located within the building footprint and driveway. All trees proposed to be removed are located either within the building footprint or the access driveway. Therefore, the number of trees which must be replaced or mitigated is zero.
- B. The subject property is a heavily wooded lot that has an extensive tree canopy. All existing trees and vegetation outside of the project area will be preserved.

### Landscape Planting Plan

- A. Landscape requirements for nonresidential developments are a combination of:
  - 1) bufferyard plantings within required setback areas;
  - 2) landscape coverage based on the overall size of the property and required landscape areas:
    - 3) landscaping around vehicular parking areas, and
    - 4) building foundation and accent plantings.

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The proposed plan meets the number of trees and shrubs required for bufferyard and landscape coverage through existing vegetation on the MSC property. The landscape plan (see Attachment 3) proposes planting 64 new trees and 414 new shrubs adjacent to the Learning Center structure exterior, parking lot, sidewalk, and abutting the public boat trailer parking lot on S. Peninsula. All species proposed are native to this part of Florida and will therefore be able to survive with minimal maintenance once established.

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### Recommendation

Based on the findings in this report, Staff recommends approval of the proposed MSC – Learning Center Expansion landscape and tree protection plan.






# LOCATION MAP

TOWN OF PONCE INLET








### TREE PROTECTION PLAN - DETAILS









### LANDSCAPE PLAN - DETAIL
