




A Moment with the Mayor

As we welcome a new year, I hope each of you enjoyed a joyful and restorative holiday season surrounded by family, friends, and the close-knit spirit that makes Ponce Inlet such a special place to call home. January offers a moment for both reflection and renewal—an opportunity to celebrate what we have accomplished together and to look with determination toward the future we continue to build as one community.

The year 2025 was a period of meaningful achievement and steady progress for Ponce Inlet. Our community successfully completed major hurricane recovery operations, securing nearly all eligible reimbursements from FEMA and insurance carriers related to Hurricane Ian. We also advanced the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' dredging and beach restoration project by collaborating with fifty beachfront property owners for temporary construction easements. This partnership exemplifies the community spirit that defines us and ensures the long-term protection of our cherished coastline.

Infrastructure improvements remained a top priority. Considerable progress was made on engineering and permitting for the town's septic-to-sewer conversion project—a vital investment in water quality and environmental preservation. Our Public Works Department completed installation of stormwater one-way "flap valves" to prevent river water from backing up into low-lying streets during King tides and storm surges, a project that will significantly reduce flooding and enhance neighborhood resilience.

Our commitment to fiscal responsibility continues to yield strong results. The Town secured a \$30,000 appropriation to fund a new fire station generator and maintained our Class 5 Community Rating System designation, which provides residents with a 25 percent discount on flood insurance premiums. The Finance Department once again achieved a perfect financial audit—our ninth consecutive year—and we once again received state funds to strengthen our cybersecurity framework through substantial software and systems upgrades.

Equally important, our public safety personnel—both the Fire Department and the Police Department—continue to ensure that Ponce Inlet remains a safe and secure community for all. Their professionalism, training, and unwavering commitment to duty exemplify the very best of public service and contribute greatly to the peace of mind we all enjoy as residents.

These accomplishments would not have been possible without the dedication of our residents, local businesses, volunteers, and municipal staff. Your engagement, service, and pride in our town define Ponce Inlet's success. As we embark on the year ahead, I am inspired by the spirit of collaboration that unites us and confident in our shared ability to overcome challenges and seize opportunities that lie before us.

I invite you to join me at the **State of the Town Address** on **February 4, 2026**, at **6:00 p.m.** at the **Ponce Inlet Community Center**. There, I will share highlights from 2025, and our staff will present strategic priorities for 2026 and beyond.

SHERIFF'S SPOTLIGHT

Hello, Ponce Inlet!

Effective law enforcement service is all about partnership and communication. I'm pleased to report that the Volusia Sheriff's Office has a wide range of public safety resources available to the Ponce Inlet Police Department, which does an outstanding job protecting your town.

I'll start with one of the most visible tools we offer: Our Air One helicopters, which performed almost 1,000 flights last year, including 96 medical calls and 113 assists on law enforcement apprehensions. Our highly trained pilots, medics, flight officers, and maintenance crew provide an essential service to every resident of Volusia County. I personally know of cases where lives and limbs have been saved thanks to a quick transport on Air One to a trauma center. We operate the countywide police, fire, and EMS dispatch service, which accounted for about 325,000 911 calls and texts last year, plus another 280,000 non-emergency calls. That's an average of 890 emergency 911s and 767 non-emergencies per day. To help free up more personnel to answer the most urgent 911 calls, we have deployed a cutting-edge A.I. system to help route non-emergency calls to the right department. It handled 121,604 of those calls from August to December, and the results were excellent.

Let me tell you: I'm the first to get frustrated with an automated customer service menu on the phone, but this new A.I. system is nothing like that. So many callers dial our non-emergency line because they just don't know who else to contact about an issue. This does a great job handling that call volume. Even if someone calls the non-emergency line with an emergency, this system can detect certain keywords and even a tone of panic in the caller's voice and route the call to a 911 dispatcher instead.



Crime is low in Ponce Inlet, but we have incredible investigative tools and technology available to your department if the need arises. VSO made 10,717 arrests countywide in 2025 with an overall 80 percent case clearance rate, far exceeding national averages in every category. That included almost 250 arrests by narcotics detectives, who recovered enough fentanyl for about 1.2 million doses last year alone.

Our new in-house ballistics lab is tied to the National Integrated Ballistic Information Network and has slashed the time it takes to process and match shell casings and guns. With advanced training from experts in the field, our Financial Crimes Unit recovered about \$1.2 million for scam victims in 2025.

To sum it all up: We're here to help, we love the Town of Ponce Inlet, and we greatly appreciate the partnership with your town leaders and police department!

This is your Volusia County Councilman, Matt Reinhart, with the next installment of our quarterly newsletter. I'm excited to share some updates, new initiatives, and important news from around our great county.



Volusia County Newsletters

I'm pleased to announce that Volusia County has launched **two new public newsletters** to help keep residents better informed.

- One focuses on **flood and stormwater management**
- and the other one highlights **coastal and environmental initiatives**.

Both can be accessed on the County's website under the "**Newsletters**" tab.

New Partnership: Pediatric E-Bike Trauma Simulation

We recently launched an innovative partnership between **Deltona Fire Rescue and Arnold Palmer Hospital for Children**.

Volusia County's **Emergency Medical Administration Division** hosted a **pediatric e-bike trauma simulation** at Deltona Fire Station 65 (2983 Howland Blvd). The exercise strengthened emergency responder skills while raising awareness about e-bike safety and the growing number of children using them.

The event included:

- Immediate medical response demonstrations
- Air and ground patient transport
- Remarks from trauma physicians, fire and EMS leaders, and emergency medical directors

I would like to also mention that I am currently working with the Volusia Sheriff's Office to enhance the county's ordinance on E-bikes and their use on our beaches. Hopefully we can get better control over their use.

VoTran: 50 Years of Service

Our county's transit system, **VoTran**, is celebrating its **50th anniversary**! As part of the celebration, VoTran has unveiled a **new logo** and announced exciting updates:

- The **Gold Service** is now renamed **VoAccess**.
- A new **on-demand service, VoRide**, is now available in West Volusia.

VoRide replaces some fixed-route services in areas with lower ridership, using **mini-vans** for flexible, cost-effective transportation. Riders can transfer to VoTran routes for longer trips.



VoRide Expansion

We're expanding VoRide to the **east side** of the county, including **Ormond Beach (north of Granada), New Smyrna Beach, Edgewater, and Oak Hill**. Public meetings will be held to gather community input before service begins.

Volusia Innovation Hub

Volusia County has introduced the new **Volusia Innovation Hub**, replacing the former UCF Business Incubator program, creating significant **taxpayer savings** while keeping innovation local.

This transformative initiative is designed to be the region's premier destination for entrepreneurship, innovation, and business growth. The Hub will support everyone from tech startups and scaling companies to international businesses seeking a U.S. base.

Public Works: Exceeding Standards

While the **American Society of Civil Engineers** requires canal and ditch inspections every three years, Volusia County goes above and beyond, performing these inspections **three times each year**, plus additional checks before every major storm event.

Also, with the assistance of the **Transform 386 Program**, we will be working with many local municipalities, including Ponce Inlet, on more robust infrastructure upgrades to assist with flooding issues. For example, County Council just approved **Transform 386** funding for Ponce Inlet to purchase property to enhance certain retention areas.

Daytona Beach International Airport (DAB)

Exciting things are happening at DAB!

- **Wings for All Program:** In partnership with **The Arc of Volusia** and **Breeze Airways**, this program helps individuals with autism or developmental disabilities and their families **practice the airport experience**, reducing travel anxiety while training airport and airline staff.

- **JetBlue Arrived December 4, 2025:** JetBlue joins our airline lineup, offering two daily nonstop flights to New York (JFK) and Boston (BOS).

- **Hidden Disabilities Sunflower Program:** DAB is now part of this **global initiative** that helps travelers with hidden disabilities receive appropriate support discreetly. Complimentary sunflower lanyards, pins, and ID cards are available at information desks and Airport Control.

These programs reaffirm DAB's commitment to an **inclusive and exceptional travel experience** for all passengers.



Volusia County Charter Review Commission

The **Charter Review Commission** has officially begun its work. Required once every ten years, this citizen-led group reviews our **Home Rule Charter** and proposes any recommended amendments for voter consideration in the next general election.

Volusia's Home Rule Charter, first approved in **1970**, made our county the **first in Florida** to adopt home rule powers under the **1968 State Constitution**. It established the **Council/Manager** form of government we use today—balancing legislative oversight with professional administration.

Senate Bill 180 (2025)

Recently signed into law, **Florida Senate Bill 180 (SB 180)** introduces several changes affecting local governments during declared States of Emergency. It **temporarily preempts** local authorities from adopting new or more restrictive land development regulations for one year following a hurricane's landfall.

While the intent is understandable, this law presents challenges for local governments like ours that need flexibility to respond to unique community needs.

Volusia County Coastal Division: New Dog Beach

At the County Council meeting on **October 7th**, the Council approved moving forward with an ordinance to add a **second dog beach location**. On **November 4th**, the measure passed **unanimously**.

The new designated dog-friendly area will span **1.7 miles**, from **Williams Boulevard** to the **Seabreeze Boulevard approach**.

Second Chance Initiative

In the previous newsletters, I have been sharing the exciting news about my **“Second Chance Initiative.”** With a unanimous vote by my colleagues, the infrastructure for the inmate farm has now begun. We will have approximately 2 acres of row crops starting the first of the year. In approximately 5–6 months, staff will bring back to council my phase 2 idea of egg-laying hens. The inmate farm as well as the other projects that have already begun, such as virtual welding for male and female inmates, hydroponics, barber training for male inmates, cosmetology training for female inmates, forklift training, small engine repair, concrete training, FDOT Flagger training, landscape maintenance & food service. There are already plans set to start a sewing program, warehouse management, irrigation, and K-9 therapy dog training.

Education and counseling are also important factors for reentry. We have a GED program as well as domestic violence counseling, drug & alcohol counseling, Life Skills I & II (for resumes, job applications, letter writing, references, personal finance, networking, and interviewing skills),

anger management counseling, OSHA certifications, and the WRAP program (Wellness Recovery Action Plan).

As I mentioned in the previous County Updates, my purpose for this initiative was to reduce the recidivism rate and train the inmate population in skills they can utilize once released from incarceration. We are already seeing positive results from this program. An example of this is just a few months ago the inmate population for Volusia County Corrections was almost 1400 inmates. This month, the count is just over 1100 inmates. The average cost to house an inmate in Volusia County in 2024 was \$110.95 per day, per inmate. That same per diem rate for 2025 is \$100.55.

A Message from Representative Chase Tramont

The 2026 Florida Legislative session began January 13th and runs for 60 days. This session, House Speaker Daniel Perez leads a Republican majority House with a strong emphasis on fiscal responsibility and bold reforms addressing affordability, driving economic growth, and enhancing public safety.

As your representative for District 30, including the wonderful town of Ponce Inlet, I am deeply grateful for the opportunity to serve you. My aide, Julie Watts, who is a Ponce Inlet resident, and I are committed to working on your behalf every day.

I remain focused on fiscal responsibility and addressing affordability challenges, including meaningful property tax reform, lowering health care costs, and reducing insurance rates. A Message from Senator Tom A. Wright

As we move into 2026, I want to thank the residents of Ponce Inlet for your continued engagement and support as the new Legislative Session gets underway. The early weeks of the session have been productive, and I am encouraged by the direction of discussions taking place in Tallahassee.

This session is off to a strong start with a clear focus on public safety, responsible growth, and protecting the quality of life that makes our coastal communities so special. As Chair of the Senate Committee on Military and Veterans Affairs, Space, and Domestic Security, I am proud to continue advocating for Florida's service members, veterans, and the Space Coast's vital role in our state and national security.

I remain especially committed to ensuring that coastal communities like Ponce Inlet have a strong voice when it comes to infrastructure, resiliency, and environmental stewardship. Whether it is supporting first responders, addressing transportation needs, or safeguarding our waterways and shoreline, these priorities are front and center as the budget process and policy discussions continue.

One of my top priorities for this session is Senate Bill 356, relating to Utility Terrain Vehicles (UTVs), often referred to as

side-by-sides. The purpose of SB 356 is straightforward: it creates a safe, structured path for local communities to opt-in to allowing UTVs on certain roads, with clear rules and accountability. Importantly, this is about bringing order and safety to something that is already happening across Florida, UTVs being operated on streets illegally or with out-of-state plates, so law enforcement has clearer tools to regulate and enforce responsible use.

SB 356 sets commonsense safeguards, including requirements tied to licensed operation, vehicle standards, and insurance, and it keeps decision-making local by limiting eligible roadways and allowing counties and cities to adopt stricter rules when needed. It also preserves safety authority for the state where appropriate.

As always, I believe the best outcomes are achieved through collaboration. I am grateful for the partnership of local leaders, residents, and community organizations who help shape the issues I bring to Tallahassee. Your input is invaluable and directly influences the work I do on your behalf.

I look forward to keeping you updated as the 2026 Legislative Session progresses and to continuing our work together to protect and strengthen Ponce Inlet and the greater Volusia County community.

WORD FROM WASHINGTON

Congressman Cory Mills:

I am honored to serve Florida's Seventh Congressional District in the U.S. House of Representatives during the 119th Congress.

It was a privilege for me to host a coffee chat with local veterans, creating an open space to listen, connect, and say thank you to the men and women who have worn the uniform and put their lives on the line for this nation. These conversations matter, because the best policy starts by hearing directly from those who have served.

We discussed key issues impacting veterans and military families, including access to Veterans Affairs services, healthcare, and benefits. I'm grateful for the honest feedback, thoughtful questions, and continued commitment these veterans show to our community.



My office helped return \$87,089,279.00 to constituents across Florida's 7th District by resolving issues with federal agencies and ensuring families received the benefits and resources they were owed.



Funds Returned by Agency:

- \$51.9 million – Social Security Administration
- \$18.4 million – Department of Veterans Affairs
- \$6.4 million – Small Business Administration
- \$3.8 million – Office of Personnel Management
- \$2.5 million – Internal Revenue Service
- \$1.1 million – U.S. Department of the Treasury
- \$609,000 – Federal Emergency Management Agency
- \$99,000 – Department of Homeland Security

In total, my team successfully resolved **5,247 constituent cases**, assisting seniors, veterans, small business owners, disaster survivors, federal retirees, and working families who needed answers and action from Washington.

I have strived to promote policies that stimulate economic growth, reduce unnecessary spending and worked to advance policies that spur economic

growth, cut wasteful spending, and restore American energy independence. This year, I supported H.R. 1, a major pro-growth, pro-family tax package with real benefits for hardworking Floridians.

According to the Tax Foundation's analysis, families in 7th district stand to receive significant tax relief under H.R. 1:

- Seminole County—Average tax cut: \$3,717
- Volusia County—Average tax cut: \$3,063

Other highlights include a major investment in Florida's rural healthcare system included in the Fiscal Year 2026 funding package as part of the One Big Beautiful Bill, delivering nearly \$210 million to strengthen access to care for rural communities across our state. Florida is home to more than 1.2 million rural residents, many of whom face persistent challenges accessing timely, affordable, and high-quality healthcare. The Fiscal Year 2026 funding, totaling \$209,938,195 for Florida, is designed to help modernize and stabilize rural health systems while expanding innovative care delivery models that meet patients where they are.

The House of Representatives advanced key Fiscal Year 2026 appropriations bills, including Commerce, Justice, Science; Energy and Water Development; and Interior and Environment, marking a major step toward restoring fiscal discipline and putting an end to years of Biden-era wasteful policies. The bill now heads to the Senate.

These bills refocus Washington on what truly matters to Floridians: public safety, strong infrastructure, secure water systems, and responsible stewardship of taxpayer dollars. Instead of funding radical agendas

that drive up energy costs and undermine law enforcement, House Republicans are delivering real, local results.

I'm especially proud to share that I have secured significant community project funding for Florida's 7th District, delivering targeted investments that strengthen public safety, modernize infrastructure, and protect our environment, without reckless spending.

Public Safety Investments

Keeping our communities safe will always be one of my top priorities. Through the FY26 Commerce, Justice, Science Appropriations bill, I secured funding to support law enforcement, first responders, and public safety training across Seminole County and beyond:

- \$1.9 million for Seminole County Sheriff's Office radio upgrades
- \$529,000 for Altamonte Springs Police Department technology improvements
- \$500,000 for Oviedo Police Department training and equipment
- \$400,000 for Seminole County juvenile crisis response initiatives
- \$350,000 for Seminole State College criminal justice training
- \$500,000 for SMART prevention and public safety education programs

These investments ensure our officers have the tools, training, and technology they need to keep Florida families safe.

Infrastructure & Environmental Projects

Florida's future depends on resilient infrastructure and responsible

environmental stewardship. Through the FY26 Interior and Environment Appropriations bill, I secured funding for critical water and infrastructure improvements across the district while also pushing back on overreach from Washington bureaucrats:

- \$1.28 million to restore Sweetwater Creek in Oviedo
- \$1.25 million for septic-to-sewer upgrades in Seminole County
- \$1 million for water main replacement in Winter Springs
- \$640,000 for reclaimed water expansion in Winter Springs
- \$750,000 for water main replacement in Lake Helen

Congressman Mills was honored to be hosted by American Legion Post 243 to present Vietnam-era veterans with a congressional pin to recognize and honor their service.

From the Town Manager, Mike Disher

As we welcome 2026, it's a natural time to reflect on the Town's recent accomplishments and look ahead. Over the past year, Ponce Inlet continued to build on recovery efforts following Hurricane Milton while strengthening preparedness and resiliency for future storms. Key work included the construction of one-way "flap valves" on Old Carriage Road, Anchor Drive, and Front Street to prevent storm surge from backflowing into low-lying streets; the installation of emergency backup generators at the Community Center, Fire Station, and Public Works; the completion of 1,000 feet of "living shoreline" at Ponce Preserve; the purchase of two undeveloped properties on South Turn Circle for future stormwater improvements; and the much-needed maintenance of drainage swales on S. Atlantic Avenue and S. Peninsula Drive.

Additional Town accomplishments included extending the 25-year cell tower lease with New Cingular Wireless; amending code regulations related to Land Acquisition Fund expenditures, utility billing disputes, and rental permits; replacing the Town's 20+ year-old backhoe; authorizing a weekly Farmer's Market at the Ponce Inlet Community Center; expediting disaster assistance through the Florida Department of Emergency Management's F-ROC program; transitioning to a Special Magistrate for code enforcement; partnering with HomeServe to provide service line warranties for residential property owners; and achieving a clean financial audit for the ninth consecutive year.

The current fiscal year budget continues to emphasize resiliency, with investments in the completion of the Adaptation Action Plan and improvements to the Town's flood



insurance rating. Looking ahead through 2026, Town Council priorities include extending sewer service to remaining unserved areas, completing the design of the S. Peninsula Drive sidewalk widening, replacing Building "B" at the Public Works facility, and establishing a stormwater utility fund.

It is our privilege to serve the community and help maintain what makes Ponce Inlet such a special place to call home. On behalf of all Town employees, we wish you a safe, happy, and productive 2026.

Your Town's Budget: What You Need to Know

The Town operates on a fiscal year from October 1 through September 30 and is required by Florida law to adopt a balanced budget each year. The Town Council sets the annual millage rate after considering projected revenues, community priorities, and rising costs, with the Truth in Millage (TRIM) process ensuring transparency and public involvement.

Budget planning is a year-round effort, beginning early in the calendar year with input from departments, advisory boards, the Town Council, and residents. Multiple public workshops and hearings are held before the final budget and tax rate are adopted in September.

Once adopted, the Town's finances are reviewed annually by an independent auditor to ensure compliance with government financial regulations and sound fiscal management practices. Reports for the past three audited years can be found at: <https://www.ponce-inlet.org/509/Auditors-Reports>. The FY 24/25 audit will be presented to the Town Council in April 2026.

This process is designed to be open, thoughtful, and responsive, ensuring that community needs are met while maintaining strong financial stewardship. The entire process is outlined in the table below. You can also review the budget documents, reports, Q&A, and meeting minutes for the past three years at <https://www.ponce-inlet.org/519/Budget>. We will be putting together this same type of information for FY 26/27, so be sure to check back regularly.



Accreditation

The Ponce Inlet Police Department is the smallest department in the State of Florida to be fully accredited. An accreditation program has long been recognized as a means of maintaining the highest standards of professionalism. Accreditation increases the law enforcement agency's ability to prevent and control crime through more effective and efficient delivery of law enforcement services to the community it serves.

The accreditation standards provide norms against which agency performance can be measured and monitored over time. The agency is compelled to operate within specific guidelines. It is accountable to the Commission for Florida Law Enforcement Accreditation. The agency must stay in compliance with the standards set forth by the Commission to retain its accreditation.

Live 911

2025 saw the implementation of new programs in the Ponce Inlet Police Department, including "Live 911." In emergency response, every second matters. The Ponce Inlet Police Department is now live streaming 911 emergency calls directly to police officers on patrol.

When a 911 call comes in, Live911 sends it out simultaneously to first responders. Officers can see the location of the caller on a map and move in the direction of the incident—giving them a head start and allowing them to develop a response plan while driving to a call for service. All the while, first responders are hearing the interactions between the caller and the call taker, including answers to questions, first-hand descriptions, emotional tones, and background noise on the scene. Live911 improves response times and increases situational awareness like never before.

Ponce Partners

The Ponce Inlet Police Department is looking for more "Ponce Partners." This program is designed to be a safety net for those who have severe health problems, live alone, or are in the early stages of cognitive decline. Any resident can become a member by completing a short request form.

When you become a Ponce Partner, you simply agree to contact the Police Department by phone each day before noon. If we do not hear from you, we call you to ensure you are ok. If we are unable to reach you by phone, we send an Officer out to check on your well-being. This program is set up to ensure our most vulnerable citizens have some form of communication each day. This program has been successful in rescuing several residents who had fallen and were unable to contact anyone for help.

From Public Safety Director and Fire Chief Dan Scales



As winter settles in, the Ponce Inlet Fire Department continues working behind the scenes to strengthen services, improve readiness, and support our community year-round. While the season may be quieter for visitors, it remains an active and productive time for the department.

Accreditation and Professional Excellence

The department continues progressing through the Center for Public Safety Excellence (CPSE) accreditation process, a nationally recognized program that evaluates fire departments against industry best practices. This work reflects a long-term commitment to accountability, operational excellence, and continuous improvement—ensuring residents receive the highest level of service possible.

In addition to accreditation efforts, the department maintained a strong focus on ISO preparation and operational improvement, including pre-fire planning, documentation, training, and response readiness. These efforts supported the Town's recent Insurance Services Office (ISO) review. In December, the Ponce Inlet Fire Department improved its Public Protection Classification from a Class 3 to a Class 2. Only about six percent of fire

departments nationwide achieve a Class 2 rating or better. This accomplishment reflects the department's dedication to excellence and provides long-term insurance benefits for residents and businesses throughout the community.

Training, Staffing and Readiness

The winter months provide valuable opportunities for focused training, equipment checks, and documentation review. Recently, the Ponce Inlet Fire Rescue Department conducted hands-on vehicle extrication training designed to better protect residents and visitors during traffic accidents.

Under the direction of Training Officer Lieutenant Steven Tornelli, three vehicles—one for each shift—were obtained to allow firefighters to train in realistic, real-world conditions. Using actual damaged vehicles gives crews the opportunity to practice critical rescue skills, including vehicle stabilization, patient protection, and safe removal techniques, all while working as a coordinated team.

Ongoing training such as this is a key part of Ponce Inlet Fire Rescue's commitment to continuous improvement. By regularly practicing complex rescue scenarios, firefighters refine their skills, stay current with best practices, and ensure they are prepared to respond when emergencies occur. This dedication helps ensure that when help is needed, residents and visitors can trust that Ponce Inlet Fire Rescue personnel are ready, capable, and focused on providing the highest level of service.

South Peninsula Sidewalk Update

Survey work along S. Peninsula Drive began in August 2024 as the first step in the sidewalk widening project, followed by the initiation of design by Volusia County. The Town received 60% of the plans in September 2025 and 90% of the plans in November 2025, with comments provided back to County staff at each stage. The County expects to finalize 100% design plans by early 2026.

The following is a tentative timeline outlining anticipated project milestones over the next two years:

2026:

- **January-February** – One-on-one meetings with individual property owners to address site-specific construction issues.
- **March** – Public Open House for all residents to be held at Ponce Inlet Town Hall or Community Center.
- **April** – Joint meeting of Cultural Services Board and Essential Services Advisory Board to review the project plans.

- **May** – Town Council meeting to present the final 100% design plans for Council review prior to contract bidding. This presentation will summarize public input received during the neighborhood meetings and outline next steps for project implementation.

- **July** – Construction bid package sent to the Town and FDOT for review and comments.

- **September** – Advertisement for construction and CEI bids.

- **October** – Construction and CEI bids opening.

2027:

- **February** – Construction contract executed.

- **March** – Construction starts.

- **October** – Construction finished.

Resiliency Update - Adaptation Plan

The Town's planning consultant, Brizaga Inc., has been diligently working on the Adaptation Plan since the end of June 2025. This initiative is funded through a \$50,000 grant from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) under the Resilient Florida program and aligns with the Town Council's goals for the Planning Division. The Adaptation Plan will identify Adaptation Action Areas to help prioritize investment and will feature conceptual designs, planning-level engineering cost estimates for priority projects, and potential funding sources.

The consultant held a public workshop on January 29, 2026, at 5:30 p.m. in the Council Chambers, which was open to all residents. Public input will be incorporated into the draft plan document prior to its presentation to the Planning Board and Town Council. Any additional feedback received at those meetings will be addressed in the final Adaptation Plan.

The Adaptation Plan is a continuation of Town's resiliency planning efforts that began in 2021 with the Vulnerability Assessment and Watershed Master Plan. The Adaptation Plan will serve as a long-term guide for strategic investments and will help strengthen community resilience over the next 10 to 30 years.

Disaster Risk Reduction Areas

Volusia County has received \$328.9 million in HUD Community Development Block Grant-Disaster Recovery funds to support Transform386, a long-term recovery initiative following Hurricanes Ian, Nicole, and Milton. Through Transform386, residents in jurisdictions that have adopted the buyout resolution may be eligible if they live within the 100-year floodplain or in designated Disaster Risk Reduction Areas (DRRAs), which prioritize properties with a high risk of repeated flooding.

STRENGTHENING VOLUSIA'S FUTURE

The Town of Ponce Inlet has submitted five proposed DRRAs to Volusia County for residents living outside the 100-year floodplain. These areas were identified using post-hurricane damage assessment mapping and flood-prone focus areas outlined in the Town's Watershed Master Plan.

The five DRRAs submitted are as follows:

1. Old Carriage Road and Anchor Drive
2. Riverglen Boulevard Area
3. Oceanside Village Subdivision (Calumet Drive to Inlet Harbor Road)
4. Bay Harbour Drive to Beach Street
5. Riverfront Area (Ocean Way Drive to Sailfish Drive)

Residents located within these DRRAs may be eligible for Transform386 CDBG-DR grant funding to support the voluntary buyout of properties that have been repeatedly impacted by flooding. Volusia County anticipates completing its review and approval of the proposed DRRAs in early 2026. Once approved, the DRRA database will be available on the County's website. The Town of Ponce Inlet will also provide a link on the Town's website for easy access.


Getting Your Landscape Ready for Cold Weather

Prior to a Freeze

Be prepared to move tender potted plants to warmer, sheltered areas if frost or freezing temperatures are forecasted in your region. Take stock of your plant covers and frost blankets ahead of time to ensure you're ready when the need arises.

Providing proper care throughout the year helps plants better withstand cold weather. Healthy plants are more resilient to cold temperatures and recover from damage more quickly.

Avoid fertilizing cold-sensitive plants in late fall or winter, as fertilizer promotes new growth that is especially vulnerable to cold injury. Similarly, delay pruning until spring, as freshly pruned plants are more prone to cold damage.





Protecting Your Plants from the Cold

Florida's winter temperatures can be erratic, so it's important to monitor the forecast and prepare to safeguard your plants.

- **Covering Plants:** During a hard freeze, cover plants completely, ensuring the cover extends to the soil to trap ground heat. For extra warmth, consider placing an electric light bulb (not LED) under the cover, ensuring safety precautions are taken.
- **Wrapping Larger Plants:** For cold-sensitive plants that are too large to cover fully, wrap their trunks with several layers of cloth or newspaper for protection.
- **Removing Covers:** Once temperatures rise above freezing, remove covers promptly to prevent overheating or moisture buildup.


Avoiding Risky Cold-Protection Methods

While gardeners use various techniques to protect plants, some methods can be impractical or even harmful. For example, overhead irrigation is effective on farms where irrigation systems are designed to run continuously from before the freeze until hours after temperatures rise. However, using a home irrigation system wastes water and can lead to heavy ice formation that damages plants.

Caring for Cold-Damaged Plants

If your plants suffer from cold damage despite your efforts, resist the urge to prune immediately. Wait until spring, as cold-injured plants will often sprout below the damaged areas, allowing you to clearly see where pruning is needed.

With careful planning and proper techniques, you can protect your plants and help them recover from winter weather challenges.





From Interim Public Works Director Steve Dunlap



The following projects highlight Public Works' continued commitment to maintaining the safety, functionality, and appearance of our town. Through routine maintenance, roadway improvements, and proactive drainage work, Public Works remains dedicated to preserving public assets and enhancing the quality of life for residents and visitors. We appreciate the community's continued support as we work to maintain and improve the Town's infrastructure.

Routine Maintenance & Facility Improvements

Public Works recently completed the replacement of worn and damaged parking lot wheel stops at the Town's boat ramp parking lot. This maintenance was necessary to improve safety, accessibility, and the overall condition of this heavily used facility. In addition, Public Works removed old mulch and re-mulched the entire dog park, providing a cleaner, refreshed appearance and improving the overall experience for pets and their owners.





As part of ongoing maintenance efforts, resurfacing of the tennis court, pickleball courts, and basketball court is planned in the coming months. These improvements will help extend the life of the courts and ensure they remain safe and enjoyable for public use.

Roadway Improvements

Public Works will be installing road base aprons at the intersections of Sailfish Drive with Beach Street and South Peninsula Drive to address ongoing roadway deterioration. Poor drainage conditions combined with turning traffic have caused repeated damage to Sailfish Drive that requires frequent maintenance. The installation of road base aprons will help stabilize these intersections and reduce the need for continual grading and repairs.

Stormwater & Swale Maintenance

Proactive stormwater maintenance remains a priority. Public Works will continue swale maintenance throughout Town, with the next project scheduled along South Peninsula Drive and within the Harbor Village area. This work is intended to improve roadway drainage and prevent standing water following rain events, helping to reduce localized flooding concerns.

Garbage & Yard Waste Guidelines for Ponce Inlet Residents

Pickup Schedule:

- **Garbage:** Collected twice a week on Monday and Thursday.
- **Recycling:** Collected once a week on Tuesday.
- **Yard Waste:** Collected once a week on Wednesday.

Garbage Container Rules

- **Place All Garbage in Containers:** Put both moist and dry garbage into garbage cans or containers for pickup. Please no loose bags at the curbside.
- **Clean Up Spills:** Pick up and place any spilled garbage—caused by dogs, cats, raccoons, wind, or people—back into cans or containers.
- **Position Containers for Easy Access:** Set garbage cans and containers where collection crews can easily reach them.



Yard Waste Disposal Tips

- **Pile Yard Waste Neatly:** Stack grass, leaves, small twigs, branches, and yard trimmings on the pavement or next to the street line for easy handling.
- **Keep Streets and Gutters Clear:** Avoid piling yard waste in the street or gutter to prevent it from washing away.

- **Protect Stormwater Drains:** Do not block stormwater drains with yard waste.

- **Cut Large Branches:** Trim large branches into pieces no longer than 4 feet and weighing no more than 40 pounds.

Yard Waste does NOT include:

- Treated Lumber
- Rocks
- Soil
- Waste generated by tree surgeons or arborist services

Yard debris co-mingled with non-organic material will not be collected.

Contractor Responsibility: If a contractor is hired for vegetation trimming or removal, they are responsible for removing and disposing of the waste, not the town's waste service.

Waste Pro handles all garbage, yard waste, and recycling removal for single-family residences in Ponce Inlet.

Celebrating a Year of Impact and Stewardship in 2025

As 2025 ends, the department reflects on another productive year marked by strong community participation, expanded programming, and meaningful progress in environmental stewardship. Through collaboration with volunteers, partners, and Town leadership, we continued to enhance recreational opportunities, education, and conservation efforts across our parks and preserves.

The Department, with invaluable participation from the community of volunteers, hosted a total of 30 programs and events with nearly 1,200 total attendees. The programs were designed to educate, connect, and engage residents of all ages. A key focus this year was expanding offerings for both youth and senior audiences, resulting in the successful establishment of six new programs tailored specifically to these age groups. These initiatives helped ensure our programs remain inclusive, accessible, and responsive to community needs.

The department also coordinated 18 events within the town, including six Town-hosted events and six events that received co-sponsorship approval from Town Council. The department sincerely thanks our volunteers, partners, and residents whose support made this work possible. The year's accomplishments reflect a shared commitment to community, education, and preservation.

Volunteers Making a Lasting Difference

Volunteers once again played a critical role in preserving and enhancing our natural spaces. A focused volunteer workday at Timucuan Oaks targeted the removal of invasive arrowhead vine, helping restore native habitat and improve overall ecosystem health. Volunteer efforts also supported major conservation initiatives, including assistance with planting smooth cordgrass as part of the Ponce Preserve Living Shoreline project, which enhances shoreline stability and resilience while providing valuable habitat.

Progress in Invasive Species Management and Education

Significant strides were made in invasive species control with the release of a new air potato beetle that targets bulbils at the base of the vine. By stopping the spread at its source, this method improves effectiveness compared to prior beetle releases and represents an important advancement in long-term management. Environmental education also expanded through the coordination of a self-guided native plant tour at Ponce Preserve, highlighting more than 60 native species along the trails. This project, made possible through volunteer dedication and donations, continues to provide visitors with an accessible and engaging way to learn about Florida's native plants.







2025 brought a lot of activity and amazing experiences to the programs department of the Ponce Inlet Lighthouse and Museum. Over the hundreds of guided tours, dozens of onsite events, and multitude of outreaches, thousands of enthusiastic guests were able to participate in the educational offerings put on by the lighthouse's volunteers and staff.

The culmination programming of the annual calendar brought together two of America's favorite topics: Baseball and Christmas. On November 15th, baseball fans from across the country descended on the quaint town of Ponce Inlet to recognize the 50th anniversary of the 1975 Cincinnati Reds World Championship team. Representatives from the Cincinnati Reds, the Hall of Fame, and the local affiliate, the Daytona Tortugas were amongst the many people that enjoyed riveting presentations and witnessed the unveiling of the newest exhibit at the Constance D Hunter Historic Pacetti Hotel Museum, the aptly named when we're hot...we're Reds hot. The sounds of the season filled the air, and the festive mood radiated throughout the grounds.

Historic presentations, children's activities, and wonderful programs from institutions honoring the rich history of Florida will excite guests of all ages. Beginning at 10:00am and lasting until 3:00pm, this event brings a rich diversity of groups together to celebrate. This event will bring even more meaning in 2026, as America continues its 250th anniversary as a nation and the 180th anniversary of Florida statehood. 

That leads me to a topic I don't cover often enough. Not long after, she encouraged us to extend our efforts to include hearing issues as well.
